


The Hate U Give


An account of James Meredith's 1966 Mississippi march to peacefully protest discriminatory practices in voter registration describes the early contributions to the establishment of the Black Power movement.


A young artist and poet's prospects at a diverse art school are threatened by a racially biased system and a tragic altercation in a gentrifying neighborhood.



An award-winning author recounts one of the most deadly and destructive acts of racial violence in American history and explores the ways the Tulsa Race Massacre is the story of America.





by Dean Atta



by Kacen Callender






Three Brooklyn teens plot to turn their murdered friend into a major rap star by pretending he is still alive.


