


## Lucy and Linh

by Kelly Yang



by Nicola Yoon



by Ibi Zoboi



by Bettina Restrepo


Nora, a fifteen-year-old Mexican girl, faces the challenges of being an illegal immigrant in Texas when she and her mother cross the border in search of Nora's father.





by Randa Abdel-Fattah






Daniel, a Chinese-American teen, must grapple with his plans for the future, his feelings for his best friend Harry, and his discovery of a family secret that could shatter everything.

by Laekan Zea Kemp


Told in two voices, Pen, whose dream of taking over her family's restaurant has been destroyed, and Xander, a new, undocumented, employee seeking his father, form a bond.

by Thanhha Lai


