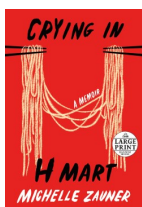

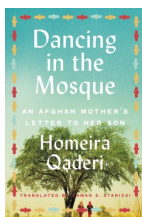

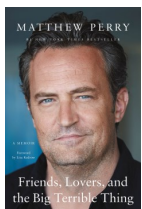

This memoir from the Afghan women's rights activist who fought the country's misogynistic social order takes the form of a letter to the son she was forced to leave behind after her husband divorced her.



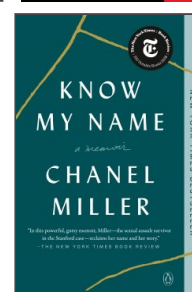
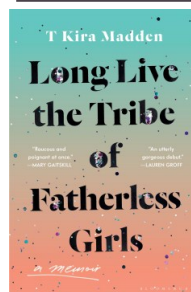
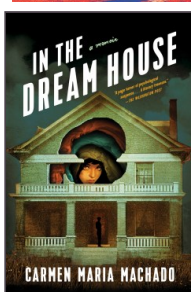
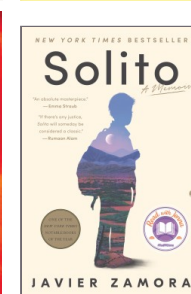
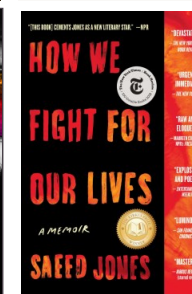
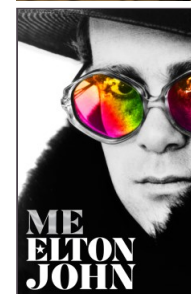
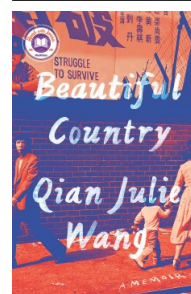
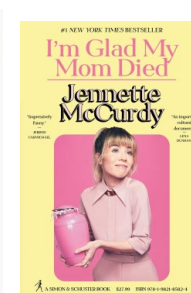
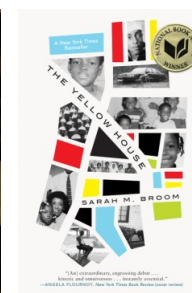
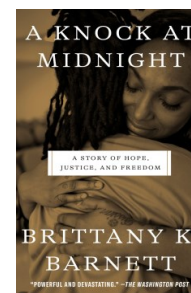
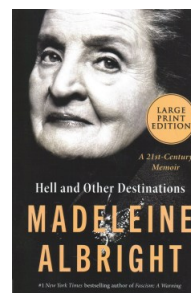
