

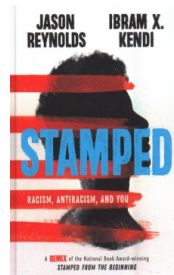


### The hate u give

by a police officer.

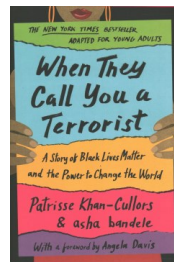


### Stamped : racism, antiracism, and you

Reveals the history of racist ideas in America from 1415 to the present while explaining their endurance and capacity for being discredited.



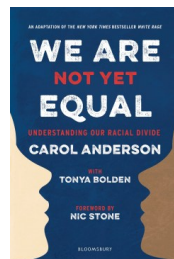
### When they call you a terrorist

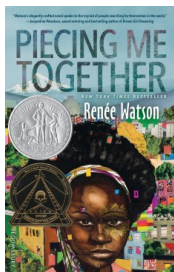

program for at-risk girls.

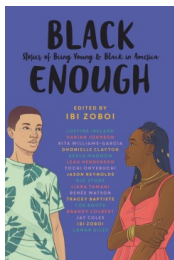


### Punching the air

by Alsey, Charity

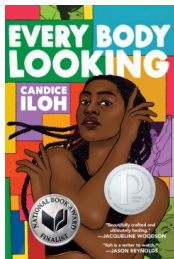

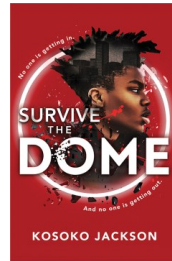


## The Black kids

by Johnson, Kim

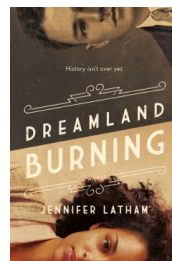
