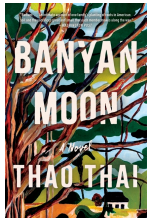


Go as a river

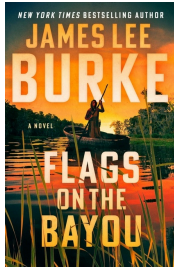




The little liar : a novel

by Mitch Albom

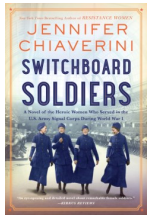

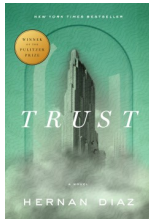


Switchboard soldiers : a novel of the heroic women who served in the U.S. Army Signal Corps during World War I

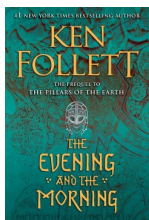
communicate between troops as bombs fell around them

by Ken Follett

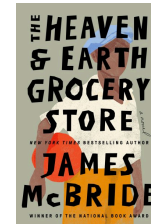
