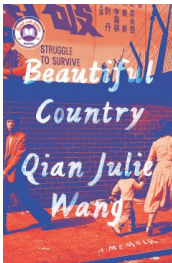


## How much of these hills is gold / : A Novel

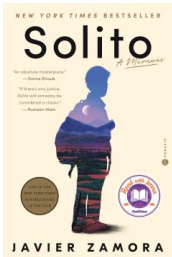

by Qian Julie Wang

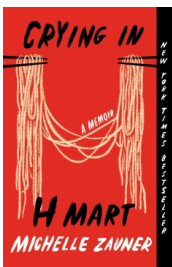

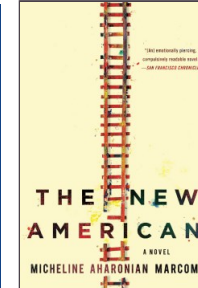
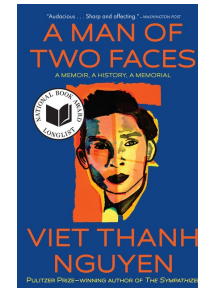
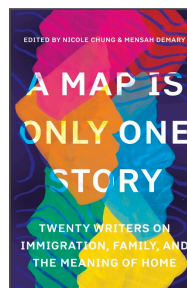
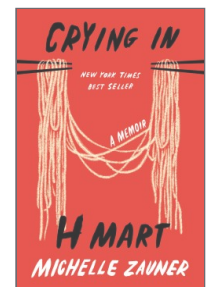
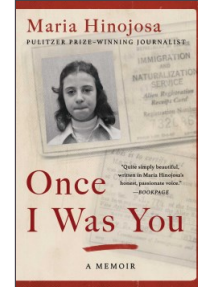
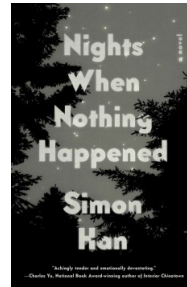
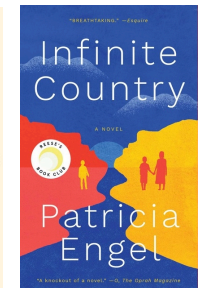
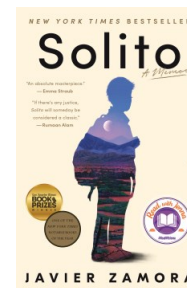
## Crying in H Mart : a memoir

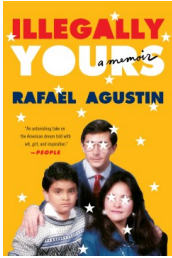

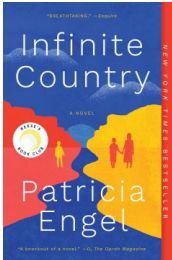

by Rafael Agustin

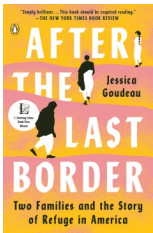

by Patricia Engel

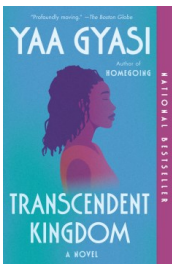

by Jessica Goudeau

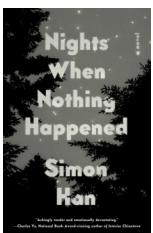
